Message From Chief Dan McGee



The world was changed forever in 2020, but we are proud to say that the Montpelier Police Department showed great perseverance throughout the difficult year. Some things got placed on the back-burner, but you will see that we continued to do a positive forward movement. So, it is with great pleasure that I present the 2020 Montpelier Police Department Annual Report.

Covid required us to make adjustments to many operations in 2020. We began restrictions on traffic stops, changed how we handled medial assist calls, and changed how we handled certain complaints. This did impact numbers, but we felt it was important to do so, in an effort to prevent our staff and the public from feeling the

affects of the dreaded Corona Virus. However, we resumed many normal operations starting in November and never saw any impact to our agency from the virus. Even with altering many things and reducing the calls we did handle, 4,545 calls of service were recorded, down just 500 from the prior year.

Police everywhere began playing defense due to the numerous issues with policing nationwide. But, our resolve has been steadfast and our desire to be progressive and leaders for policing continued. In 2020, we again showed our desire to be at the front when we obtained the remaining certifications from the Ohio Community-Policing Collaborative, including our final certification for the Presidential Executive Order on Safe Communities-Safe Policing, making MPD the only agency in Williams County to do so.

The world is still plagued by overdose deaths, which was mixed into the 2020 pandemic fallout; however, MPD was there to save lives in 2020, with 13 life-saves. We made arrests in fake bomb threats, two major theft cases of thousands of dollars, stolen vehicle recoveries and continued our efforts with effective traffic stops which led to drug arrests. We saw the new hire of several officers from full time to Reserve, purchased some new cruisers, and continued to complete many community-service projects.

It is always the vision of this agency to be a bridge between every corner of our town and extended, county-wide community. We will continue to move forward and continue to work with the other agencies. We've seen a great development of unity between all of the municipal police departments in the county, and one that developed a network of resources which will benefit Montpelier citizens and beyond.

Please read and enjoy what MPD has been doing in 2020. We are extremely proud of our work and our efforts to be leaders. Our community policing philosophy helps us engage our many citizens, and this Annual Report is another method in doing so. Something we've been doing for 11 years straight!

It is my honor to work alongside the many great officers of this agency. It is my honor to work alongside the many great agencies of this county. And, it is my honor to present to you MPD's work in 2020, in this annual report. We hope you enjoy learning about your police department!

OHIO COLLABORATIVE COMMUNITY-POLICE INFORMATION

In December 2014, Gov. Kasich signed an executive order creating a task force on community-police relations. In 2015, Gov. Kasich then created the Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board, to oversee recommendations on policy and practices of Ohio police agencies. In 2016, the Montpelier Police Department became the first agency in Williams County to comply with the standards and practices set by this board. The below information assists MPD in maintaining compliance with the standards we have met, through release of public information. MPD is proud of our commitment to maintain a professional, community-based police department. Today, MPD maintains the only agency within Williams County in total compliance with the OCCPA.

REFLECTION 2020

In 2020 we saw a steady amount for Calls of Service, only being down 500 from the previous year, even with reducing services for part of the year due to Covid. We added two new Reserve Officers (Chris Suydam and Daniel Nieves), and watched one of our Reserve Officers be promoted to fulltime officer. of Ptl. Austin Batt served with our Reserve Unit since 2018 and previously worked fulltime with Delta Police Department. We also saw a full time member leave due to maternity, and decide to dedicate herself to her family.

We added two new cruisers to our fleet, bringing all but one cruiser up to date as an SUV, and added a UTV to our fleet for off-road responses. We continued our efforts with community policing with Chief doing a Family Movie Night drawing during the end of the school year, we did our first National Night Out venture in several years (with much success), and our Reserve Unit assisted with security at many school events.

Also in 2020, MPD A.L.E.R.T. Team members voted to open up membership to our tactical team, to officers from any agency in the county. All police departments were given notice that if they had an officer who wanted to be on our team, the officer could apply for membership. What this does is open up the use of the team for other entities, in a bilateral manner.

Our officers continued their efforts by adding 72 hours of training and completing 62.5 hours of public service, in addition to the 665.5 hours volunteered by our Reserve Unit. MPD also finalized efforts to complete our new Firearms and Training Range, which we are excited to start using in 2021.

MPD was prepared for the Covid pandemic with a good stock of PPE, changed certain practices, and moved to a thorough daily cleaning process, which helped keep MPD healthy and unaffected by the virus! We also helped design and propel forward a county-wide MOU which outlined how agencies would assist one another, if an agency was devastated by Covid.

RESERVE UNIT

The Montpelier Police Reserve Unit, Inc., is a volunteer organization which augments services of the fulltime staff. Reserve Officers ride along to assist officers in daily duties, as well as staff high school games, and assist at other events.

The Advanced Law Enforcement Resource and Tactics (A.L.E.R.T.) team began development in 2014, launching in 2015. The team is made up of skilled and diverse officers of this agency, whose goal is to provide additional support for critical incidents and a higher-level of performance.

The mission of the ALERT team is to support and augment the Montpelier Police Department with a more advanced response to critical or higher-risk incidents, and help reduce the risk of injury to innocent citizens, police officers, and suspects. The ALERT Team shall operate with a lawful purpose, within the scope of the laws of Montpelier and State of Ohio, ensuring that all persons are afforded their rights given to them under the Constitution of the United States.
